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Member Satisfaction Survey provides important information

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WCE strives to maintain level of service that has resulted in consistently high scores

One main goal of your cooperative is to improve your quality of life. That is done by delivering reliable electricity to homes and businesses, by working to provide electricity at the most affordable rates and working with members to help them use electricity efficiently to manage their bills; all while maintaining a culture of safety for our staff and educating members about how to stay safe around electricity.

"You, our members, provide the best guidance through volunteer feedback to determine if we are meeting our goals and if we need to make any adjustments by measuring your satisfaction with our service and other questions about how you use electricity," General Manager Michael Newland said.

In the fall and winter of 2023-24, West Central Electric Cooperative, along with 48 other co-ops in Missouri, Oklahoma and Iowa, participated in the Member Satisfaction and Appliance Saturation Survey conducted every two years by our generation cooperative, Associated Electric Cooperative, Inc. (AECI). Randomly-selected members were sent an email invitation from the research partner working with AECI to take the survey online.

Member Satisfaction Survey gives us important information

In general, the survey focused on measuring member satisfaction and cooperative performance in several service and operations areas, such as contact experiences, handling problems, service reliability, outage restoration and cooperative principles. Feedback on additional areas such as communications, online account management, social media use, attributes of electricity, electric vehicles and household energy use, was also collected.

"We sincerely appreciate our members who took the time to respond to this survey," Newland said. "Your feedback is critical to understanding how well we are meeting your expectations and how to adjust processes and communication to exceed your expectations in the future."

How did West Central Electric score?

As a part of the survey, member responses to four questions (Overall Satisfaction, Meeting Expectations, Comparison to an Ideal Utility Company, and Likelihood to Choose Again) were sent to the American Customer Satisfaction Index (ACSI®), a company that measures customer satisfaction across multiple industries throughout the entire United States. For 2024, West Central Electric received an ACSI score of 87 on a 100-point scale. Your cooperative's score is higher than the cooperative energy utilities national average (78), the investor-owned utilities national average (74) and the municipal utilities national average (75) per the industry ratings in the 2024 ACSI AECI Member Satisfaction Survey.¹

What do the marks mean?

Overall, WCE members indicated high levels of satisfaction with performance related to restoring power, having knowledgeable employees, keeping blinks and outages to a minimum and being a name members trust. Although we try to regularly communicate about the cooperative difference and the benefits of being a member of the cooperative, many members do not realize these benefits. When respondents were asked if they consider themselves a member, an owner or a customer of the co-op, only 47 percent indicated they identify as a member/owner.

"We strive to ensure you know you are a member, and not merely

a customer, and to educate you on the advantages of being a member and owner of your cooperative," Newland said. "You, and all our other members, are truly the reason WCE exists."

What is top priority to you?

Additionally, when ranking attributes of electricity, members indicated that reliability is the top priority. When asked to rank the order of importance for reliable, affordable and zero carbon and/or renewable electricity, 51 percent of members said that reliability is most important, 43 percent of members said that affordability is most important and 6 percent of members said that having zero carbon and/or renewable energy is most important.

What do we do with this information?

All survey results will be used to help guide the co-op's strategic direction. The survey data can help prioritize opportunities for improving member satisfaction and engagement.

"Over the past 14 years, our scores have either remained steady or increased, and we are proud that you feel we are doing a good job living up to your expectations," Newland said. "Our employees work every day to live out the co-op message for our members. It's what we do."

oday's Classroom

Program sends knowledge, resources back to classroom

If you are a teacher, getting the opportunity to attend a two-day course that earns you professional development hours, allows you to network with teachers from around the state and provides you with materials to take back to your classroom -- all at no cost to you -- may sound too good to be true. If you are a teacher familiar with electric cooperatives and what they do for their local communities, however, you know it is just par for the course.

This summer Arianna Hunter, Warrensburg High School science teacher, attended the Energy in Today's Classroom program sponsored by Missouri's electric cooperatives. The program is a two-day course designed to fully support Missouri's statewide educational standards and provide teachers with a background in energy and energy production including energy basics, power generation and transmission, eco-

nomics and energy production and more.

"Before the program, I did not understand energy demands," Hunter said. "I am very much pro-nuclear energy, and love that nuclear energy is part of our energy mix, but I didn't understand that nuclear energy is steady and can't adjust as easily to peak demand times like the Bagnell Dam and the gas plants. Now when I'm teaching, I'm able to explain the pragmatic aspects of Missouri's energy situation."

Participants also tour a substation and an operating power plant. In addition to the materials and information covered during the course, participating teachers are awarded a gift card to spend for classroom materials.

"I loved touring the Bagnell Dam and substation. It was so interesting to see how the energy is harvested. I knew a lot of the theoretical idea but it was incredible to see it in person," Hunter said. "I was able to purchase scientific calculators for my chemistry students, which they will be able to use during our energy unit when we begin quantifying energy in chemical bonds. I am also looking forward to using the radiometer to show how energy can be converted from one form to another."

Teachers attending the course participate in 15 hours of classroom training over a period of two consecutive days, and receive 15 hours of professional development. Middle and high school educators who focus on math, science, agricultural science, energy, and building trades are ideal candidates for this course.

Hatfield earns journeyman status

West Central Electric lineman Austin Hatfield completed his apprenticeship and test, and was promoted to journeyman lineman in August.

Hatfield joined the cooperative in July 2023 and

Locate leaks before cold sets in

The best way to measure air leaks in your home is through a blower door test that depressurizes the house. This test is typically part of an energy audit conducted by a qualified technician. Your cooperative offers general energy audits with a 50-50 cost share (capped at \$175) between the member and cooperative available for more intense audits. Even without a blower door test, here's how to find some air leaks, according to the U.S. Department of Energy:

Inside inspection – Inside your home, look for any cracks and gaps in the following areas:

- Electrical outlets
- Switch plates

 Door and window frames

 Electrical and gas service entrances

- Baseboards
- Weather-strip-

ping around doors • Fireplace

dampers

Attic hatches
Wall- or win-

dow-mounted air conditioners.

- · Cable TV and phone lines
- · Where dryer vents pass through walls

Vents and fans

• Pipes and wires, foundation seals, even mail slots

Outside inspection – On the outside of your house, inspect:

• All areas where two different building materials meet, including all exterior corners, outdoor water faucets, where siding and chimneys meet and areas where the foundation and the bottom of exterior brick or siding meet

• Exterior storm windows and doors to make sure they are securely fastened

 Regular windows and doors – if you can rattle them or see daylight around them, you've got leaks

To do your own blower-door pressurization test to find leaks. DOE says to:

• Turn off all combustion appliances, such as gas burning furnaces and water heaters, on a cool, very windy day; if you don't want to turn off the furnace, turn on all exhaust fans

• Shut all windows, exterior doors and fireplace flues

• Turn on all exhaust fans that blow air outside, such as your clothes dryer, bathroom fans, or stove vents, or use a large window fan to suck the air out of the rooms

• Light an incense stick and pass it around the edges of common leak sites; wherever the smoke wavers or is sucked out of or blown into the room, there's a draft; you also can also use a damp hand to locate leaks – drafts will feel cool to your hand.
