Capital credits checks will not be mailed Members will see money credited to their active accounts, instead

Following their monthly meeting in May, West Central Electric's board of directors opted to change plans for the mailing of capital credits checks to members who have money coming.

It was stated in the June issue of *West Central Electric News* that checks would be mailed July 1, 2011. Because of the

cost-savings, directors voted to instead credit members' accounts .

"Mailing the 10,049 checks to our active members would have cost the cooperative more than \$6,500," WCE General Manager Mike Gray said.

Capital credits will appear as credits on the August billing.

"If a member is on our level payment program, the credit will not affect their monthly amount due," Office Manager Sandy Starke said. "The credit will be applied to the balance on the account.

"If a member has multiple accounts, the credits will be applied based on the largest balance first, then the next until fully applied. If there are no current balances on the account, the credit will be applied to the primary account, the account that West Central has determined as holding the main membership," she said.

If a member has multiple accounts, and would like the credit applied to a different account than the one determined by the cooperative, members may call the office and request a transfer to the account of their choice.

Members who purchased electricity from the cooperative between 1993 and 2010, will receive capital credits. If you do not see a credit on your account, and feel you should have, you may contact Sandy Starke at 1-800-491-3803 or 660-584-2131.

Nearly \$1,000,000 in Capital Credits refunded

This year, capital credits will appear as a credit to your electric account, and will be noted as such on the bill you receive Aug. 1.

Capital Credits being distributed this year include :

- ♦ 100% of WCE's and CFC's allocation for 1993
- ♦ 2% of WCE's allocations for the years 1994-2010

If you were were a member of the cooperative during these years, you should receive a refund.

West Central Electric Cooperative, Inc. Minutes of the 2010 Annual Meeting of Members, August 7, 2009 To be approved at August 5, 2011 Annual Meeting of Members

The 71st Annual Meeting of Members of West Central Missouri Electric Cooperative, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as "Cooperative"), was held at the multipurpose building on the campus of the University of Central Missouri, Warrensburg, Johnson County, State of Missouri, on Friday, August 6, 2010, pursuant to the bylaws of the Cooperative and previous resolution by the Board of Directors.

Registration began at 5:00 p.m. A dinner was served and pre-meeting musical entertainment was provided by David Rest. Aren Dameron, a 2010 Youth Tour Delegate to Washington, D.C., gave a brief speech and report about her experience in Washington, D.C.

The business meeting was called to order by Donna Matthews, President of the Cooperative, at 7:00 p.m. Robert Simmons, Assistant Secretary of the Cooperative, acted as Secretary of the meeting and caused the minutes of the meeting to be kept.

The President called on Allison Duncan, another Youth Tour participant, to lead the membership in the Pledge of Allegiance and a video presentation of the National Anthem. A prayer of invocation was offered by Director Ron Steelman.

President Matthews introduced special guests in attendance at the meeting, the Board of Directors, and Cooperative attorneys.

Attorney Matt Krohn was called upon to verify the presence of a quorum. Mr. Krohn noted that the quorum formula required the presence of 295 members and that 568 members had registered for the meeting, and therefore a quorum was established for the transaction of business.

President Matthews presented and explained the Agenda and Order of Business to come before the meeting. By consent, the Agenda was accepted as presented. Assistant Secretary Robert Simmons presented the Notice of Meeting and Affidavit verifying mailing of the Notice to each member. He then directed membership attention to the Unapproved Minutes of the 2009 Annual Meeting of Members, held on August 7, 2009, that were printed with the Notice of Meeting. On motion made, seconded and passed, the reading of minutes was

waived and the minutes were approved as printed.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ms. Matthews presented the President's Report. She asked the members to consider giving support to ballot proposals presented by the Board of Directors pertaining to bylaw amendments and amendment to the Articles of Incorporation. She reviewed significant achievements of the past year and stated the Board's continued commitment to providing reliable service at the lowest reasonable cost.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Treasurer Paul Nolte presented Treasurer's Report. He directed member attention to the financial information contained in the meeting program that was taken from the Cooperative's 2009 Audit. The report included comparisons from 2009 and 2008. On motion made, seconded and passed, the membership resolved to approve the Treasurer's Report.

BYLAW ELECTION

Attorney Rod Widger was called on to present an explanation of bylaw proposals to be considered by the membership. He went through the written changes that were contained in the Notice of Meeting and presented the rationale for each of the Board recommendations. The chair received questions from the membership regarding bylaw amendment proposals and the amendment to the Articles of Incorporation. The membership engaged in a full discussion and debate. The members were given instructions regarding the use of voting ballots that were distributed at registration.

ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

Attorney Matt Krohn conducted the election of Directors. He called on Walter Hutcherson to present the report of the Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee placed in nomination Max Swisegood from District 1, and Ron Steelman and Stan Rhodes from District 2.

Mr. Krohn noted that there were no nominations received by petition. He then called for nominations from the floor. After waiting the required time, the nominations were declared ceased without objection. Since the number of nominees was the same as the number of vacancies, Mr. Krohn suggested that

it would be appropriate to elect Max Swisegood for District 1, Stan Rhodes for District 2, and Ron Steelman for District 2, by motion. On motion made, seconded and passed, the members resolved to elect the candidates to the vacancies to which they were nominated.

The membership was instructed to submit their ballots on the other governance issues to be counted as the meeting progressed. The members cast their votes and inspectors of the election collected those ballots and left the meeting to determine the results of the voting.

ENTERTAINMENT

Mr. Tom Burgoon was introduced to provide meeting entertainment. Mr. Burgoon presented a very interesting program of magician arts and skill.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Following Mr. Burgoon's entertainment, Ms. Matthews called on Interim Manager, Mike Gray for the Manager's Report. Mr. Gray gave a detailed report of the status and condition of the Cooperative. He highlighted significant operational accomplishments and service efficiency improvements. He called on the membership to remain vigilant regarding legislative proposals affecting the cost of power generated by the Cooperative. He commended employees of the Cooperative for their dedication and service to the membership.

ELECTION RESULTS

Attorney Krohn returned to the platform to present the results of the voting on governance issues. He reported that Proposition 1, for the amendment of the Articles of Incorporation, failed with 110 "yes" votes and 460 "no" votes. He reported that Proposition 2, regarding the realignment of Director districts failed with 124 "yes" votes and 441 "no" votes. He reported that Proposition 3, regarding general amendments and updating of Cooperative Bylaws failed with 120 "yes" votes and 431 "no" votes.

ADJOURNMENT

The President then asked for any unfinished or new business. There being none, on motion made, seconded and passed, the business meeting was adjourned and the membership proceeded to participate in prize drawings.

Proposed Bylaw Changes

The Board of Directors recommends to the membership some revisions to Articles I, II & III of the Cooperative's Bylaws. The proposed revisions are being recommended to update the bylaw wording and to bring the bylaws in line with the current

needs and practices of the Cooperative. The proposed changes follow in this newsletter verbatim. Language that is proposed be deleted has a line through it and language proposed to be added is highlighted and is green in color.

Bylaws

West Central Electric Cooperative, Inc. Higginsville, Missouri

Article I Membership

Section 1. Requirements for Membership:

Any person, firm, association, corporation, or body politic or sub-division thereof may become a member in West Central Electric Cooperative, Inc., (hereinafter called the Cooperative") by:

- (a) filing an written application for membership therein;
- (b) agreeing to purchaseing from the Cooperative electric energy as hereinafter specified;
- (c) agreeing to comply with and be bound by the articles of incorporation and bylaws of the Cooperative and any rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Directors; and
- (d) paying the membership fee, if any, as established by the Board of Directors as hereinafter provided; provided, however, that no person, firm, association, corporation or body politic or subdivision thereof shall become a member unless and until he or it has been accepted for membership by the Board of Directors or the members. No member may hold more than one membership in the Cooperative, and no membership in the Cooperative shall be transferable, except as provided in these bylaws.

At each meeting of the members held subsequent to the expiration of a period of six months from the date of incorporation of the Cooperative, all applications received more than ninety days prior to such meeting which have not been accepted or which have been rejected by the Board of Directors shall be submitted by the Secretary to such meeting and, subject to compliance by the applicant with the requirements hereinabove set forth, any such application may be accepted by vote of the members. The Secretary shall give each such applicant at least ten days written notice of the date of the members' meeting to which his application will be submitted and such applicant shall be entitled to be present and heard at the meeting.

Section 2. Membership Certificates. Proof of Membership

Membership in the Cooperative shall be evidenced by a membership certificate which shall be in such form and shall contain such provisions as shall be determined by the Board of Directors. Such certificate shall be signed by the President and by the Secretary of the Cooperative and the corporate seal shall be affixed thereto. No membership certificates shall be issued for less than the membership fee, if any, established by the Board of Directors as provided in these Bylaws nor until such membership fee has been fully paid for in cash. In case a certificate is lost, destroyed or mutilated a new certificate may be issued therefore upon such uniform terms and indemnity to the Cooperative as the Board of Directors may prescribe.

The membership list maintained by the Cooperative shall be conclusive as to membership status.

Section 3. Joint Membership:

A husband and wife may apply for a joint membership and, subject to their compliance with the requirements set forth in Section 1 of this Article, may be accepted for such membership. The term "member" as used in these bylaws, shall be deemed to include a husband and wife holding a joint membership and any provisions relating to the rights and liabilities of membership shall apply equally with respect to the holders of a joint membership. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the effect of the hereinafter specified action by or in respect to the holders of a joint membership shall be as follows:

- (a) The presence at a meeting of either or both shall be regarded as the presence of one member and shall have the effect of revoking a proxy executed by either or both and of constituting a joint waiver of notice of the meeting;
 - (b) The vote of either separately or both jointly shall constitute one joint vote;
 - (c) A proxy executed by either or both shall constitute a joint waiver proxy.
 - (d) A waiver of notice signed by either or both shall constitute a joint waiver.
 - (e) Notice to either shall constitute notice to both;
 - (f) Expulsion of either shall terminate the joint membership
 - (g) Withdrawal of either shall terminate the joint membership;
- (h) Either but not both may be elected or appointed as an officer or director, provided that both meet the qualifications for such office.

Section 4. Conversion of Membership:

(a) A membership may be converted to a joint membership upon the written request of the holder thereof and the agreement by

such holder and his or her spouse to comply with the articles of incorporation, bylaws and rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Directors. The outstanding membership certificate shall be surrendered, and shall be re-issued by the Cooperative in such a manner as shall indicate the changed membership status. The records of the Cooperative shall be changed in such a manner as shall indicate the changed membership status.

(b) Upon the death of either spouse who is a party to the joint membership, such membership shall be held solely by the survivor. The outstanding membership certificate shall be surrendered, and shall be re-issued. The records of the Cooperative shall be changed in such a manner as shall indicate the changed membership status; provided, however, that the estate of the deceased shall not be released from any debts due the Cooperative.

Section 5. Membership Fees:

The membership fee, if any, shall be established from time to time by the Board of Directors upon payment of which a member shall be eligible for one service connection.

Section 6. Purchase of Electric Energy:

Each member shall, as soon as electric energy be available, purchase from the Cooperative all electric energy used on the premises specified in his application for membership, unless otherwise agreed to by the Board of Directors. Each member and shall pay therefore at rates which shall from time to time be fixed by the Board of Directors. It is expressly understood that amounts paid for electric energy in excess of the cost of service are furnished by members as capital and each member shall be credited with the capital so furnished as provided in these bylaws. Each member shall pay to the Cooperative such minimum amount regardless of the amount of electric energy consumed, as shall be fixed by the Board of Directors from time to time. Each member shall also pay all amounts owed by him to the Cooperative as and when the same shall become due and payable.

Section 7. Termination of Membership:

- (a) Any member may withdraw from membership upon compliance with such uniform terms and conditions as the Board of Directors may prescribe. The Board of Directors of the Cooperative may, by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of all the Directors, expel any member who fails to comply with any of the provisions of the articles of incorporation, bylaws or rules or regulations adopted by the Board of Directors, but only if such member shall have been given written notice by the Cooperative that such failure makes him liable to expulsion and such failure shall have continued for at least ten days after such notice was given. Any expelled member may be reinstated by vote of the Board of Directors or by vote of the members at any annual meeting or special meeting. The membership of a member who for a period of six (6) months after service is available to him has not purchased electric energy from the Cooperative, or of a member who has ceased to purchase energy from the Cooperative, may be cancelled by resolution of the Board of Directors.
- (b) Upon the withdrawal, death, cessation of existence or expulsion of a member, the membership of such member shall thereupon terminate, and the membership certificate of such member shall be surrendered forthwith to the Cooperative. Termination of membership in any manner shall not release a member or his estate from any debts due the Cooperative.
- (c) In case of withdrawal or termination of membership in any manner, the Cooperative will repay to the member the amount of the membership fee paid by him, provided, however, that the Cooperative shall deduct from the amount of the membership fee the amount of any debts or obligations owing from the member to the Cooperative.

Article II Rights and Liabilities of Members

Section 1. Property Interest of Members:

Upon dissolution, after

- (a) all debts and liabilities of the Cooperative shall have been paid, and
- (b) all capital furnished through patronage shall have been retired as provided in these bylaws, the remaining property and assets of the Cooperative shall be distributed in the proportion which the aggregate patronage of each bears to the total patronage of all members during the seven years next preceding the date of the filing of the certificate of dissolution, or, if the Cooperative shall not have been in existence for such period, during the period of its existence.

Section 2. Non-liability for Debts of the Cooperative:

The private property of the members shall be exempt from execution or other liability for the debts of the Cooperative and no member shall be liable or responsible for any debts or liabilities of the Cooperative.

Article III Meetings of Members

Section 1. Annual Meeting:

The annual meeting of the members shall be held on the first Friday in August in the year 1951 and in the year of 1952 and subsequent years said annual meeting shall be held on some day in the months of June, July, August or September, the exact day each year to be determined and fixed by resolution of the Board of Directors of the Cooperative at least sixty (60) days prior to the date of said meeting, at such place within a county served by the service area of the Cooperative, as shall be designated by the

Board of Directors of the Cooperative and specified in the notice of the meetings, for the purpose of electing directors, passing upon reports for the previous fiscal year, and transacting such other business as may come before the meeting. In the absence of such designation by the Board of Directors, the annual meeting shall be held at such place in the City of Higginsville in the County-of Lafayette and State of Missouri as shall be designated in the notice of the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the Board of Directors to make adequate plans and preparations for the annual meeting. If the day fixed for the annual meeting shall fall on a Sunday or legal holiday, such meeting shall be held on the next succeeding business day. Failure to hold the annual meeting at the designated time shall not work a forfeiture or dissolution of the Cooperative.

Section 2. Special Meetings:

Special meetings of the members may be called by resolution of the Board of Directors, or upon a written resolution of the Board of Directors, or upon a written request signed by any three directors, by the President, or by ten percentum or more of all the members, and it shall thereupon be the duty of the Secretary to cause notice of such meeting to be given as hereinafter provided. Special meetings of the members may be held at any place within one of the counties the area served by the Cooperative, specified in the notice of the special meeting.

Section 3. Notice of Members' Meetings:

Written or printed notice stating the place, day and hour of the meeting, and in case of a special meeting or an annual meeting at which business requiring special notice is to be transacted, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered not less than ten days nor more than twenty five days before the date of the meeting, either personally or by mail, by or at the direction of the Secretary, or upon a default in duty by the Secretary, by the persons calling the meeting, to each member. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed delivered when deposited in the United States mail, addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the records of the Cooperative, with postage thereon prepaid. The failure of any member to receive notice of an annual or special meeting of the members shall not invalidate any action which may be taken by the members at any such meeting.

Section 4. Quorum:

As long as the total number of members does not exceed two thousand, five percentum of the total number of members presentin person shall constitute a quorum. In case the total number of members shall exceed two thousand, five percentum A quorum shall consist of two percent (2%) of the first two thousand members and two percentum one percent (1%) of the members in excess thereof present in person shall constitute a quorum. If less than a quorum is present at any meeting, a majority of those present in person may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

Section 5. Voting:

Each member shall be entitled to only one vote upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members. All questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members voting thereon in person or by proxy, except as otherwise provided by law, the Articles of Incorporation or these bylaws.

Section 6. Proxies:

A member may vote by proxy executed in writing by the member. Such proxy shall be filed with the Secretary before or at the time of the meeting. No proxy shall be valid after sixty days from the date or its execution. No proxy shall be valid unless it shall designate the particular meeting at which it is to be voted and no proxy shall be voted at any meeting at which it is to be voted and no proxy shall be voted at any meeting other than the one so designated or any adjournment of such meeting. A member may give his proxy only to another member or to an adult relative living in the same home as such member, and no person may hold more than two proxies at any meeting. The presence of a member at any meeting shall revoke a proxy theretofore executed by him and such member shall be entitled to vote at such meeting in the same manner and with the same effect as if he had not executed a proxy.

Section 7. Order of Business:

The order of business at the annual meeting of the members and, so far as possible, at all other meetings of the members, shall be essentially as follows, except as otherwise determined by the members at such meeting:

- (1) Approval of the agenda.
- (1) (2) Report as to which members are present in person in order to determine the existence of a quorum and which members are represented by proxy.
- (2) (3) Reading of the notice of the meeting and proof of the due publication or mailing thereof, or the waiver or waivers of notice of the meeting, as the case may be.
 - (3) (4) Reading or unapproved minutes of previous meetings of the members and taking of necessary action thereon.
 - (4) (5) Presentation and consideration of reports of officers, directors and committees.
 - (5) (6) Election of directors
 - (6) (7) Unfinished business
 - (7) (8) New business
 - (8) (9) Adjournment

Dave Rest


For your listening pleasure, West Central Electric Cooperative is pleased to announce that Dave Rest will again be providing the music during dinner and prior to the start of the business meeting.

Section 6. Proxies


A member may vote by proxy executed in writing by the member. Such proxy shall be filed with the secretary before or at the time of the meeting. No proxy shall be valid after sixty (60) days from the date of its execution. No proxy shall be valid unless it shall designate the particular meeting at which it is to be voted and no proxy shall be voted at any meeting other than the one so designated or any adjournment of such meeting. A member may give his proxy only to another member or to an adult relative living in the same home with such member, and no person may hold more than two proxies at any meeting. The presence of a member at any meeting shall revoke a proxy theretofore executed by him and such member shall be entitled to vote at such meeting in the same manner and with the same effect as if he had not executed a proxy.
